

## **Actions to Take in the Event of Ballistic Missile Attack (Revised) (For Foreign Language Speakers)**

Ballistic missile is expected to reach Japan within an extremely short period of time. It could be as short as 10 minutes from the launch. If a possibility of missile landing in Japan emerges, Japanese government sends out a message via 'J-Alert' (designed to communicate instant emergency information), along with the emergency warning sirens using public speaker. Japanese government also uses emailing system to send out emergency information.

J-Alert is sent out via public speakers set up by municipal government, also via cellular phone, radio, television, etc, along with the message (in Japanese) as shown below.

**(Ex.) Evacuate immediately. Evacuate immediately. Go inside a sturdy building or go to a basement floor. A missile may land on the ground. Evacuate immediately to inside a building.**

If your cellular phone plays the sirens you've never heard of and the message in Japanese, ask a Japanese person nearby to find out what the message means, and...

### **Go Inside a Sturdy Building or go to a basement floor.**

● If you are outdoors, cover your mouth and nose with a handkerchief, move away from the ground zero and go inside an air-tight room or move toward the upwind side.

● If you are indoors, stop the air fan, close windows and seal up gaps between window and wall in order to seal the room you are in.
